Attached for your information are several documents which summarize JTPA funding levels for Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) 1990-91 and the planned service levels for public assistance recipients. This information has been taken from the final job training plans submitted by Service Delivery Areas (SDAs).

As indicated in the attachments, the statewide funding level for Title IIA increased by 11.8% over last year; statewide funding for Title IIB increased by 13.3%. As a result, 29 of the 32 SDAs have experienced some increase in their Title IIA funding levels.

Federal Job Opportunities and Basic Skills Training (JOBS) Program regulations require coordination of services among local social services districts, local educational agencies, SDAs and other agencies to maximize the use of available resources and to minimize the duplication of services. Local districts are encouraged to continue the existing dialogue which has been established under the Comprehensive Employment Plan (CEP) program with their respective SDAs regarding job training services to public assistance recipients and the exchange of necessary information to maintain client records within the employment subsystem.

JOB TRAINING PARTNERSHIP ACT FUNDS

JTPA authorizes grants to the states for training services for the disadvantaged under Title II of the Job Training Partnership Act. The basic criterion for determining eligibility for service in the JTPA Title II programs is economic need, such as recipients of poverty-level incomes, recipients of public assistance, food stamps or foster care youth. The Title II programs are categorized in two parts: Part A and Part B.

TITLE II, PART A (IIA): ADULT AND YOUTH PROGRAMS

- 78% The major share of JTPA funds allotted to New York State (78% of Title IIA) are allocated directly to the SDAs for training programs which are planned and administered by the local partnerships between local government officials and Private Industry Councils (PICs).
- 22% The remaining portion (22%) of Title IIA are set-aside for use by the governor for specific purposes:
 - a. 8%, Education Coordination and Grants,
 - b. 3%, Training Programs for Older Individuals,
 - c. 6%, Performance Awards and Incentive Grants, and
 - d. 5%, State Activities and Administration.

TITLE II, PART B (IIB): SUMMER YOUTH EMPLOYMENT AND TRAINING PROGRAM (SYETP)

The purpose of the SYETP is to:

- o enhance basic education skills of youth
- o encourage school completion or enrollment in supplementary or alternative school programs; and,
- o provide eligible youth with exposure to the world of work.

SYETP funds may be used to provide education, training, employment, and support services to economically disadvantaged youth ages 14-21 during the summer months.
