This report, prepared pursuant to section 20(5) of the Social Services Law (SSL), concerns: A report made to the New York Statewide Central Register of Child Abuse and Maltreatment (SCR) involving the death of a child.
The death of a child for whom child protective services has an open case.
The death of a child whose care and custody or custody and guardianship has been transferred to an authorized agency.
The death of a child for whom the local department of social services has an open preventive service case.

The Office of Children and Family Services (OCFS) is mandated by section 20 of the SSL to investigate or cause for the investigation of the cause and circumstances surrounding the death, review such investigation, and prepare and issue a fatality report in regard to the categories of deaths noted above involving a child, except where a local or regional fatality review team issues a report, as authorized by law.

Such report must include: the cause of death; the identification of child protective or other services provided or actions taken regard to such child and child's family; any extraordinary or pertinent information concerning the circumstances of the child's death; whether the child or the child's family received assistance, care or services from the social services district prior to the child's death; any action or further investigation undertaken by OCFS or the social services district since the child's death; and as appropriate, recommendations for local or state administrative or policy changes.

This report contains no information that would identify the deceased child, his or her siblings, the parent, parents, or other persons legally responsible for the child, and any members of the deceased child's household.

By statute, this report will be forwarded to the social services district, chief county executive officer, chairperson of the local legislative body of the county where the child died and the social services district that had legal custody of the child, if different. Notice of the issuance of this report will be sent to the Speaker of the Assembly and the Temporary President of the Senate of the State of New York.

This report may <u>only</u> be disclosed to the public by OCFS pursuant to section 20(5) of the SSL. It may be released by OCFS only after OCFS has determined that such disclosure is not contrary to the best interests of the deceased child's siblings or other children in the household.

OCFS' review included an examination of actions taken by individual caseworkers and supervisors within the social services district and agencies under contract with the social services district. The observations and recommendations contained in this report reflect OCFS' assessment and the performance of these agencies.

Presenting Information

A 7065-Agency Reporting Form was submitted to OCFS by Suffolk County Department of Social Services which stated on 07/28/18 at about 12:00AM, the mother breastfed the three-month-old infant and put him into his bassinet to sleep. The mother immediately noticed the child sneezed and started to vomit, with blood coming from his nose and mouth. The paternal aunt called 911 and the child was transported to the hospital where he was pronounced deceased on 07/29/18 at 10:25PM.

Executive Summary

This fatality report concerns the death of a three-month-old male child that occurred on 7/29/18. The child died during an open investigation of an SCR report that was received the day prior by Suffolk County Department of Social Services (SCDSS), with concerns relating to the mother's alleged inability to care for the child, resulting in the fatal incident. A 7065-Agency Reporting Form was completed by SCDSS and sent to OCFS on 07/31/18.

The child resided with his parents, 4yo sibling, and multiple other family members including grandparents, aunts, uncles, cousins and a great-grandparent. The open CPS investigation was a result of an SCR report made regarding the fatal incident on 07/28/18, after the child was found unresponsive and with what appeared to be blood coming from his nose and mouth while in his mother's care.

Both LE and SCDSS completed investigations regarding the death and LE shared information and statements from the family. It was learned that the child was found unresponsive after the mother had placed him in his bassinet, following breastfeeding. The mother was practicing safe sleep and no concerns were noted with the baby's sleep environment. The family called 911 and the child was transported to the hospital, where life saving measures were performed. The child was temporarily revived; however, he experienced irreversible brain damage. The child passed away on 07/29/18 at 10:25PM.

The other children were not immediately aware of the fatal incident and had no role in the child's death. SCDSS attempted to engage the children on multiple occasions, but the children were not willing or able to provide much information. During home visits, SCDSS found no safety concerns regarding the surviving children.

An autopsy was not performed due to the family's religious beliefs and the cause of death was undetermined. Although the exact cause of death remained unknown, medical staff did not attribute the child's death to maltreatment, neglect or abuse. According to the child's pediatrician, the child was born prematurely, which may have contributed to the death because he would be more medically compromised and fragile than children born at full-term. LE closed their investigation with no criminal charges filed.

SCDSS thoroughly investigated the death of the child. Household members were interviewed and relayed no concerns for the care of the child or other children in the home. The family provided strong support to one another through the tragedy. The family was offered services including burial assistance, bereavement services and counseling referrals, which the family declined.

LDSS Response

On 07/29/18, SCDSS continued their investigation into the fatal incident regarding the subject child, who was involved in an open SCR report. The report was made after the mother found the child unresponsive and not breathing in his bassinet. The child was born 9 weeks prematurely and remained in the hospital for 6 weeks after his birth, due to having a low birthweight. At the time the child was discharged, medical professionals had no concerns. The parents reported that prior to the fatal incident, the child had been doing well, was gaining weight and the pediatrician was pleased with his progress.

SCDSS alerted the DA and ME of the death, completed a CPS history check and contacted the source of the report to gather more information.

The case record reflected discussions between medical staff and SCDSS stating there were no signs of abuse or maltreatment regarding the child's death, and no SCR report regarding the fatality was warranted.

The investigation revealed the mother fed the child and placed him in his bassinet around 12:00AM on 07/28/18. The child appeared to be congested and was twisting his body as if he had gas pains. The mother reported being in the room with the 5yo sibling when she heard the infant sneeze about 20 minutes later, and checked on him. She noticed the child was not

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breathing, was turning purple and had what appeared to be blood and vomit coming from his mouth and nose. The mother was unsure if the substance coming from the child was blood or the Tylenol she had given to him prior. The medication was recommended by the pediatrician and the mother administered it as directed. She screamed immediately for help. The paternal grandmother called 911 while the mother blew air into the child's mouth and the grandmother "tapped" on the child's back. The grandmother also splashed water on the child's face as she thought he had "passed out."

The family believed the ambulance would take too long to get to the house, and decided to drive the child to the hospital themselves. However, as the family went outside, the fire chief was passing by, was flagged down and provided CPR to the child. The child was transported to the hospital with his parents and arrived at the ER in cardiac arrest and respiratory distress.

Medical staff revived the child after administering CPR for 30 minutes; however, he was in critical condition. The doctor reported the child had "minimal brain functioning and would not survive to be a normal, healthy child." The child went into acute respiratory failure with hypoxia and hypercarbia, a condition involving elevated carbon dioxide levels in the blood. It was found the child also had acute bronchitis and pneumonia. On 07/29/18 at 10:25PM, the child was pronounced deceased.

SCDSS obtained records from numerous collateral contacts, including the fire chief and law enforcement. The family was interviewed and had no concerns for the care that was provided to the infant or any of the children in the home. SCDSS made diligent efforts to interview the children; however, the children were unable to provide information regarding the fatal incident, as they were sleeping at the time. The children were aware that the infant went to the hospital and died.

The family was adequately engaged by SCDSS and all identified services needs were offered, however, were declined.

SCDSS accurately unsubstantiated the allegations regarding the fatal incident, after conducting a thorough investigation. The safety assessments were completed timely and were fitting to the case circumstances.
